Each year, PHENND's K-16 Partnerships Network hosts a day long convening about university, school, and community partnerships and is a day of planning, reflection, and sharing of information. This year we partnered with the Office of Environmental Management & Services at the School District of Philadelphia for the theme of this year's conference Education for Sustainability (EfS). Under this office, the District developed GreenFutures, a five-year sustainability plan that was created by District staff and stakeholders with a common goal: to make public schools great and green.

A key component of GreenFutures is EfS, a holistic framework to equip students, schools, administrators, families and the community with the skills, knowledge and habits of mind that will prepare them to create and contribute to a world where economic prosperity, social justice and responsible citizenship may be strengthened while restoring our health and that of the living systems upon which our lives depend.

Lunch Discussion: Implications for Teachers and Teacher candidates

During lunch, Jaimie Cloud facilitated a discussion with faculty who work with pre-service teacher candidates at Saint Joseph's University, Temple University, and West Chester University. Faculty discussed their interests in, and the important of introducing pre-service teachers to EfS, but cited the challenge of meeting the demands of internal and external requirements for teacher education programs. PHENND and GreenFutures hope to continue to engage faculty in conversations about EfS and teacher candidate programs.

Institute Feedback

After the institute, PHENND sent out a postsurvey of which thirteen (13) participants filled out. All 13 participants rated the institute as either Good, Very Good, or Excellent. Participants overwhelmingly had positive comments on Jaimie Cloud's presentation. Additional comments and room for growth include:

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THE 2019 PHILLIP B. LINDY AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN K-16 PARTNERSHIPS – EDUCATION FOR SUSTAINABILITY PARTNERSHIPS

The Phillip B. Lindy Award aims to recognize a collaborative partnership between at least one K-12 school and one university. This award will be given to the entire partnership, not an individual. Phil Lindy valued collaboration and communication among diverse stakeholders in order to maximize impact. This year the Lindy Award was given two partnerships that addressed this year's theme of the K-16 Institute – Education for Sustainability.

First Place: IMPACT Philly:Jefferson University & Mercy Career & Technical High School

IMPACT Philly seeks to provide experiential learning opportunities for high school students to cultivate confidence and leadership skills while giving back to the community. With the assistance of Jefferson University, students use innovative problem solving methods to address needs of local non-profits and design practical solutions.



PROJECT SACRED SCARVES

Team Sacred Scarves has partnered with the Ronald McDonald House to create 250 personalized head scarves for kids and their siblings dealing with cancer for their 2019 Summer Oncology Camp in the Poconos. The scarves come in the form of an activity kit that aims to help childhood cancer patients feel more confident after losing their hair while undergoing chemotherapy.

Runner-up Samuel Compers K-8 School and Saint Joseph's University Partnership

For more than three decades, Samuel Gompers K-8 School ("Gompers") and Saint Joseph's University ("SJU") have worked as community partners. With the announcement of Gompers being selected as a Community School by the Mayor's Office of Education in the summer of 2017, a needs assessment was conducted, including input from all of Gompers' stakeholders. With priorities set from the needs assessment, the Gompers-SJU partnership has expanded greatly over the past two years, and to date, now comprises of approximately 40 distinct programs that span approximately 20 different departments at SJU.

The 2019 Lindy Award application highlighted one of our most effective and long-standing partnerships – the Seedlings Program through SJU's biology department. Now in its 15 year, SJU science majors teach lessons to 4th and 5th grade Gompers students through the Seedlings program. Growing out of that relationship, SJU, along with Main Line Health, provide a free week-long health science camp that includes lessons, field trips and mentorship for rising 4th and 5th graders at Gompers. These two exemplary programs highlight the reciprocal nature of our partnership as both SJU and Gompers students benefit.

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
